The FY'15 budget is the first budget of the newly expanded PreK-12 Acton-Boxborough Regional School District. The District now includes all five Acton elementary schools (formerly the Acton Public School District) and Boxborough's Blanchard Memorial elementary school (formerly the Boxborough Public School District) along with Acton-Boxborough's Junior High and High Schools.

Please note that this budget presentation for the Town Meetings of Acton and Boxborough contains some transitional information. The history for the new Acton Boxborough Regional School District begins with FY'15. Therefore, some of the charts will include data from Acton Public Schools and Boxborough Public Schools (and will be marked appropriately) in order to provide a comparison. Some will show data from the three previous districts because of the type of information provided (i.e. grants for FY'14). Eventually, this budget document will include only data from the Acton-Boxborough Regional School District.

Superintendent's Budget Message

The Transitional School Committee welcomes your participation in the upcoming budget cycle. We have an exciting and challenging task ahead of us: for the first time we will be producing a Pre-K to Grade 12 annual operating budget. Currently, the proposed FY'15 operating budget for the Acton-Boxborough Regional School District (Pre-k to 12) is \$76,181,499, up \$855,404. This can be seen as a 1.14% increase over the "artificial" FY'14 budgets if combined, or a 2.62% increase over the FY'14 budget once regional transportation reimbursements are removed. My goal for this fiscal year for this first "unified" budget was to a) implement the first PreK to grade 12 budget while successfully including savings from regionalization; b) meet the growing state and federal requirements for school leadership and c) meet the needs of increasing numbers of our at-risk students. The significant factors in the FY'15 budget are:

- 1) Salaries: Salaries and Retirement expenses show a decrease of \$50,664, even after accounting for changes in steps and lanes for union and non-union staff.
- 2) Health Insurance: Insurance and Benefit costs will go up by \$419,372.
- 3) SPED Tuition: In part because of a change in how the CASE tuition is being proposed, the SPED Tuition account is going up by \$1,067,889.
- 4) Utilities: A small \$28,169 decrease is being proposed: for the first time, we are capturing the next round of energy savings from our continuing energy conservation programs and placing \$155,200 in capital repair and small capital equipment accounts to make sure we continue to protect the previous investment in our buildings and equipment.
- 5) All other accounts across the district are projected to decrease by \$683,024 partly due to anticipated savings from regionalization.
- 6) OPEB: The regional district continues to prepare for our long-term post-employment benefits liability with another \$506,000, an increase of \$130,000 over last year.

Our proposed school budget for FY'15 assumes that state educational aid (Chapter 70) will be fully funded as projected in the Governor's proposed budget but assumes a small decrease related to our dropping district-wide enrollment. Just like last year, the complexities of balancing the state budget due to the severity of the recession make it unlikely that the final amount of state aid will be confirmed before the Acton and Boxborough Town Meetings.

As I conclude my tenure as your superintendent, I want to express my deep appreciation to the citizens of Boxborough and Acton for your support for our schools. This budget, if approved, will meet our stated goal of continuing to provide "level service" for our students for the upcoming year, with strategic investments in staff – no small feat due to the uncertain financial times. Cognizant of the financial pressure that is affecting households across the state, I am confident this budget contains sufficient resources so that the dedicated staff of the Acton-Boxborough Regional Schools can continue to provide a tremendous school experience for our students. Thank you for your support. It was my pleasure to serve as your Superintendent.








ABRSD Budget Categories - FY '15



The following charts represent the total expenditures from appropriated and non-appropriated sources from the last complete fiscal year for each of the three school districts: APS, BPS, and ABRSD





Acton-Boxborough Regional High School

- A-B's Trivia Team qualified to appear on Channel 2's High School Quiz Show. The competitions air on WGBH through May 12. They qualified for a National Tournament in Washington D.C. in May.
- Forty-nine AB students won awards in the highly competitive Boston Globe Scholastic Arts
 Competition. The students earned 8 Gold Keys (three of which were portfolios), 19 Silver Keys,
 and 22 Honorable Mentions. Gold Key winning artwork is on display at Boston City Hall through
 March 28. Gold Key winning work will be sent to New York for the national judging. Also, there
 are 14 ABRHS students whose work was selected for the Annual Youth Art Month Show which is
 being held at the State Transportation Building in Boston. This exhibit runs through April 25.
- The Performing Arts Department has held a number of successful performances and the Chamber Choir was selected to perform at the Massachusetts Music Educators All State Conference concert hour. The Band performed a concert tour in Ireland where they marched in an international St. Patrick's Day parade.
- For the third year in a row, A-B has had a finalist in the Intel Science Talent Search. Forty students nationwide were invited to Washington, D.C. to present their research to nationally recognized scientists and qualify for prize money.
- Proscenium Circus' fall play The Tempest was followed by the blockbuster Footloose. The
 Massachusetts Drama Guild competition play Paper Stars which was written and directed by
 two AB seniors, made it to the State Finals. The season is rounded out by the Competitive Class
 plays and the Festival of 10-Minute Plays. Sixteen young playwrights took part in the
 playwrights workshop held at Boston University where three AB original plays were performed
 by professionals in Boston.
